

Mrs. Jones will be retiring from teaching after a long career on May 25, 1984. A lot has happened during those successful years.

Miss Hunt became Mrs. Jones on June 16, 1966 in the Salt Lake Temple. She inherited a 21 year old son. She then was the coordinator for the extension classes which lasted from 1960-1965. She taught in Ogden 1965 to 1966 and 1977-1984 in the Oral Department.
